ORDINANCE NO. 4116

An ordinance to amend certain provisions of Chapter 6 (Animals), Article II (Dogs and Cats), of the City's Code of Ordinances to provide for a Community Cat Program.

WHEREAS, communities across the country have recognized the challenges presented by feral and stray cat populations that are not spayed or neutered; and

WHEREAS, these same communities also have recognized that a responsible "Community Cat Program," in which healthy feral cats and stray cats are captured, sterilized, ear-tipped, and vaccinated for rabies, before being returned to the location at which they were found (also known as a Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) program), can assist significantly with cat population control and also aid in rodent control; and

WHERAS, the City of Slidell wishes to formally adopt such a program.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Slidell City Council, in legal session convened, that it hereby adopts a Community Cat Program by amending Chapter 6 (Animals), Article II (Dogs and Cats), of the City's Code of Ordinances as follows:

1. Section 6-37 of Article II of Chapter 6 of the Code, previously reserved, is added to read:

Section 6-37. - Community Cat Program.

a) Definitions.

Community cat means any altered or unaltered cat, having been found to be at large and lacking identifying information for an owner/keeper and that may or may

not be feral, that is trapped, assessed, sterilized, marked, and returned, by the city or its designee, per the provisions below.

Community cat caretaker means any person who provides food and/or water to a community cat or cats, and who is not an owner, keeper, custodian, or harborer of the community cat(s).

b) Establishment of Community Cat Program.

There is hereby established a Community Cat Program for the city, to be administered by the city through its office of animal control or its designee.

All cats that are part of the Community Cat Program shall:

- 1) Upon initial capture, be assessed by a veterinarian and deemed healthy;
- 2) Be sterilized;
- 3) Be microchipped (optional);
- 4) Be vaccinated against the threat of rabies;
- 5) Be ear-tipped for easy identification; and
- 6) After fulfillment of the above, be returned to the location at which it was found, which return shall not be considered abandonment.
- c) If the requirements of subsection b) are met, the community cat is exempted from any licensing, stray, at-large, or other provisions of this chapter that apply to owned animals, except that, in no event shall a community cat be exempted from the nuisance provisions of this chapter. However, a community cat shall not be deemed a nuisance solely for running at large. Further, a community cat caretaker shall not be subject to the provisions of this chapter directed towards owners and owned animals.
- d) A person may file a complaint with animal control stipulating a specific community cat problem. Animal control will offer education and tools, such as deterrents, to lessen any nuisance or it may require relocation or removal from the community cat program of any nuisance community cat
- e) Nothing in this section shall prevent the office of animal control from picking up, receiving, or impounding a community cat for necessary medical treatment, and then releasing the cat when deemed medically appropriate by animal control or the animal control veterinarian.
