RESOLUTION R08-28

A resolution by the Slidell City Council opposing the enactment of a "Competitive Cable and Video Act" by the Louisiana State Legislature and requesting the St. Tammany Parish legislative delegation resist the lobbying efforts of the telecommunications industry to impose franchise restrictive laws upon Parish and Municipal Governments.

WHEREAS, the Louisiana State Legislature adopted House Bill No. 699 during the 2006 Regular Session to enact the Competitive Cable and Video Services Act restricting local governmental subdivisions from issuing cable and video franchises, and establishing pre-emptive state law for the franchising or otherwise regulating of cable or video services within the state; and

WHEREAS, then Louisiana Governor Kathleen Blanco vetoed House Bill No. 699 citing concerns with the actual impact of the bill on revenue loss to local governments, legal rights to right-of-way access under the law, and interference with existing contractual obligations between local governments and current franchisees; and she encouraged advocates and opponents of the bill to work together in formulating a model local ordinance for the franchising of telecommunication services; and

WHEREAS, lobbying efforts by the telecommunications industry have already begun in seeking the 2008 Legislature to again adopt a cable and video anti-local franchise law at its Spring 2008 regular session; and

WHEREAS, the Slidell City Council is opposed to the adoption of anti-local franchising legislation by the Legislature for the following reasons;

Control of local rights-of-way must remain with local government.

- Local government must have access to local television to ensure emergency communications.
- Cable/video franchises are necessary to require build-out provisions to ensure that all areas have affordable access to services.
- Build-out provisions are essential for small business development.
- Cable/video franchises are necessary to provide local programming for public, educational and government access stations.
- Cable/video franchises are non-exclusive and encourage competition among service providers.
- Cable/video franchises are essential in assuring proper customer service by providers.
- Cable/video franchises are essential in assuring upgrading of services as technology improves and avoidance of substandard systems adversely impacting future economic development within regions of the state.
- State preemption reduces or eliminates franchise fees essential for right-ofway maintenance and assistance in paying state mandated costs.
- State preemption permits transferable "certificates" without verification of the holder's ability to properly provide services and maintain infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, the Slidell City Council respectfully requests the St. Tammany Legislative Delegation resist the lobbying efforts of the telecommunications industry to

obtain support for franchise restrictive state laws; and to vote against any bill imposing said laws upon parish and municipal governments; and

WHEREAS, the Slidell City Council respectfully requests the Louisiana State Legislature not adopt franchising restrictive cable and video legislation in the 2008 session.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Slidell City Council that it does hereby oppose the adoption of franchise restrictive cable and video laws by the Louisiana State Legislature in the 2008 Legislative Sessions for the reasons herein above stated.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the St. Tammany Parish Legislative Delegation is respectfully requested to resist the lobbying efforts of the telecommunications industry for support of franchise restrictive laws adversely affecting parish and municipal governments.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that a copy of this Resolution be delivered to the Louisiana Municipal Association with a request that it be distributed among their respective memberships; and that a copy be provided to the Clerk of the Louisiana House of Representatives, the Secretary of the Louisiana Senate and Governor Bobby Jindal.
