PUBLIC HEARINGS

Sean Fadely appeared before the Council and asked whether the change would involve a monetary adjustment or simply a change in the trash collection schedule. Councilman Tamborella responded that the change pertains only to the collection time. As no one else appeared, the Council President closed the public hearing.

Councilwoman King expressed concerns about the change, noting that she has received numerous complaints regarding how early dumpsters are emptied at businesses. Councilman Tamborella clarified that the change does not affect commercial accounts.

An ordinance changing certain staffing levels within the City of Slidell's Purchasing Department.

WHEREAS, under City Ordinance 4229, the City Council established personnel staffing and position classification levels for each City department for fiscal year 2025-2026; and

WHEREAS, City Council approval is generally required to amend, change, increase, or reallocate any pay grade levels or staffing; and

WHEREAS, upon recommendation of the Mayor, the City Council desires to authorize the elimination of the Buyer I position within the Purchasing Department in favor of the addition of a Buyer III position within the Purchasing Department; and

WHEREAS, sufficient appropriations have been made for the Purchasing Department to fund such modified staffing.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Slidell City Council that, within the Purchasing Department, it does hereby (i) eliminate the Buyer I position; and (ii) add a Buyer III position.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

RESOLUTION R25-32

A resolution declaring the intention of the City of Slidell, State of Louisiana, to issue Taxable Utilities Revenue Bonds (DEQ) in an amount not to exceed Five Million One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$5,100,000) and providing for other matters in connection therewith.

WHEREAS, the City of Slidell, State of Louisiana (the "City") now owns and operates a combined waterworks system and sewer system (the "Utilities System") as a revenue-producing work of public improvement; and

WHEREAS, the Slidell City Council (the "City Council"), as governing authority of the City, proposes that revenue bonds will be issued by the City for the purpose of making improvements, extensions, renewals, replacements, or repairs to the sewer portion of the Utilities System in the manner prescribed by and under the authority of Part XIII, Chapter 4, Title 39 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended (La. R.S. 39:1011, et seq.), and other constitutional and statutory authority (the "Act"), payable solely from the income and revenues to be derived from the operation of the Utilities System, after provision has been made for the payment therefrom of the reasonable and necessary expenses of administering, operating and maintaining the Utilities System; and

WHEREAS, this governing authority now desires to give notice of intention pursuant to the Act to issue not exceeding \$5,100,000 of bonds to finance improvements to the Utilities System; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Slidell City Council (the "City Council"), acting as the governing authority of the City, that:

SECTION 1. <u>Intent to Issue Revenue Bonds</u>. Pursuant to and in compliance with the provisions of the Act, and other constitutional and statutory authority, this City Council does hereby declare its intention to issue not exceeding Five Million One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$5,100,000) of Taxable Utilities Revenue Bonds or other evidences of indebtedness in the name of the City (the "*Bonds*"), the proceeds of which will be used to pay the cost of making improvements, extensions, renewals, replacements, or repairs to the sewer portion of the Utilities System.

The Bonds shall be limited and special revenue bonds of the City, shall be secured by and payable in principal and interest and related fees, solely from the income and revenues to be derived by the City from the operation of the Utilities System, after provision has been made for the payment therefrom of the reasonable and necessary expenses of administering, operating and maintaining the Utilities System. The Bonds shall not be a charge on the other income and revenues of the City, nor shall they constitute an indebtedness or pledge of the general credit of the City. The Bonds shall be issued and

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shall bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding ninety-five hundredths percent (0.95%) per annum (including any Administrative Fee associated therewith), and mature no later than twenty-two (22) years from the date thereof. It is presently anticipated that a portion of the Bonds will benefit from the forgiveness of a portion of the total principal amount of such Bonds as advanced.

The City will, in such ordinance(s), enter into such covenants with the future owner or owners of the Bonds as to the management and operation of the Utilities System, the imposition and collection of rates and charges for the services rendered thereby, the disposition of such fees and revenues, the issuance of future bonds and the creation of future liens and encumbrances against the Utilities System and the revenues therefrom. the carrying of insurance on the Utilities System and the disposition of the proceeds of insurance, the keeping of books and records, and other pertinent matters as may be deemed proper by this City Council to assure the marketability of the Bonds, consistent with the provisions of the Act and other applicable laws and regulations. Such ordinance(s) will also include remedies in case of default, provision for the issuance of parity bonds, and such additional covenants, agreements and provisions as are judged advisable or necessary by the City for the security of the registered owners of the Bonds, including sinking funds and reserves for the payment of principal and interest on the Bonds and an adequate depreciation fund for those repairs, extensions and improvements to the Utilities System as may be necessary to assure adequate and efficient service to the public, all as provided by the Act.

SECTION 2. <u>Sale of Bonds</u>. The Bonds may be sold at a private sale to the Clean Water State Revolving Fund and may be issued and sold in installments as needed, all as provided for in the Act and other statutory authority.

SECTION 3. Public Hearing. This City Council will meet in open and public session, on TUESDAY, JANUARY 27, 2026 at 6:30 p.m., at the City of Slidell City Hall. 2045 Second St., Slidell, Louisiana 70458, or at an earlier or later regular or special meeting of the City Council to be determined by the City Council, in consultation with bond counsel and duly advertised in the manner provided by law, to hear any objections to the proposed issuance of the Bonds; provided, however, if at such hearing a petition or petitions duly signed by the electors of the City in an aggregate number not less than five percent (5%) of the number of the electors of the City voting in the last election held in the City object to the issuance of the Bonds, then the Bonds shall not be issued until approved by a vote of a majority of the qualified electors of the City who vote at a special election held for that purpose in the manner provided by law. Any such petition shall be accompanied by a certificate of the St. Tammany Parish Registrar of Voters certifying that the signers of the petition are registered electors of the City and the number of signers amounts to not less than five percent (5%) of the registered voters that voted in the last election held in the City, all as provided by the Act.

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SECTION 4. <u>Notice of Intention</u>. The City is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to publish an appropriate notice of the intention of the City to issue the Bonds in accordance with the provisions of this resolution and the Act. Such notice of intention shall be published in four (4) consecutive weekly issues of the official journal of the City, and shall be in substantially the following form, with any such changes as may be necessary upon the advice of bond counsel:

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ISSUE NOT EXCEEDING \$5,100,000 OF TAXABLE UTILITIES REVENUE BONDS OF THE CITY OF SLIDELL, STATE OF LOUISIANA

As provided by a resolution adopted by the Slidell City Council (the "City Council"), acting as the governing authority of the City of Slidell, State of Louisiana (the "City"), on July 25, 2017, the City HEREBY DECLARES ITS INTENTION to issue up to Five Million One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$5,100,000) of Taxable Utilities Revenue Bonds (the "Bonds"), for the purpose of making improvements, extensions, renewals, replacements, or repairs to the sewer portion of the combined waterworks system and sewer system (the "Utilities System") of the City.

The Bonds shall be limited and special revenue bonds of the City, secured by and payable solely from the income and revenues to be derived from the operation of the Utilities System, after provision has been made for the payment therefrom of the reasonable and necessary expenses of administering, operating and maintaining the Utilities System. The Bonds will not be a charge on the other income and revenues of the City, nor shall they constitute an indebtedness or pledge of the general credit of the City. The Bonds will be issued pursuant to Part XIII, Chapter 4, Title 39 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended, and/or other applicable laws (collectively, the "Act").

The Bonds will be issued and authorized by ordinance adopted by the City Council, in one or more series, will mature not later than twenty-two (22) years from their date of issuance, will bear interest at rates not more than 0.95% per annum, and will be subject to prepayment anytime without penalty. It is presently anticipated that a portion of the Bonds will benefit from the forgiveness of a portion of the total principal amount of such portion as advanced. All of the other details of the Bonds will be set forth in the ordinance(s) authorizing their issuance.

THE PUBLIC IS HEREBY NOTIFIED that the governing authority of the City will meet in open and public session on TUESDAY, JANUARY 27, 2026 at 6:30 P.M., at the City of Slidell City Hall, 2045 Second St., Slidell, Louisiana 70458, to hear any objections to the proposed issuance of the Bonds. If at such hearing a petition duly signed by electors of the City in a number not less than five percent (5%) of the number of such electors voting in the last election held in the City object to the issuance of the Bonds, then the Bonds shall not be issued until approved at an election held for that purpose. Any such petition must be accompanied by a certificate of the St. Tammany Parish Registrar of Voters certifying that the signers of the petition(s) are registered electors of the City and the number of signers amounts to not less than five percent (5%) of the registered voters that voted in the last election held in the City, all as provided by the Act.

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SECTION 5. <u>State Bond Commission</u>. Application is hereby made to the State Bond Commission, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, for approval of the issuance and sale of the Bonds, and co-bond counsel are directed to make application to the State Bond Commission in accordance with the foregoing on behalf of the City.

By virtue of the City's application for, acceptance and utilization of the benefits of the State Bond Commission's approval requested herein, the City understands and agrees that such approval is expressly conditioned upon, and further understands, agrees and binds itself, its successors and assigns, to full and continuing compliance with the "State Bond Commission Policy on Approval of Proposed Use of Swaps, or other forms of Derivative Products, Hedges, Etc.," adopted by the Commission on July 20, 2006, as to the borrowing and other matters subject to the approval, including subsequent application and approval under said Policy of the implementation or use of any swaps or other products or enhancements covered thereby.

SECTION 6. Employment of Bond Counsel. This City Council finds and determines that a real necessity exists for the employment of special counsel in connection with the issuance of the Bonds, and accordingly, Foley & Judell, L.L.P., of New Orleans, Louisiana, as Bond Counsel, is hereby employed to do and perform work of a traditional legal nature as bond counsel with respect to the issuance and sale of said Bonds. Said Bond Counsel shall prepare and submit to this City Council for adoption all of the proceedings incidental to the authorization, issuance, sale and delivery of such Bonds, shall counsel and advise this City Council as to the issuance and sale thereof and shall furnish its opinions covering the legality of the issuance of the Bonds. The fee of Bond Counsel for each series of Bonds shall be fixed at a sum not exceeding the fee allowed by the Attorney General's fee guidelines for such bond counsel work and based on the amount of said Bonds actually issued, sold, delivered and paid for, plus "out-of-pocket" expenses, said fees to be contingent upon the issuance, sale and delivery of said Bonds. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to execute, and this City Council hereby agrees to and accepts the terms of, the engagement letter of Bond Counsel appended hereto. A certified copy of this resolution shall be submitted to the Attorney General of the State of Louisiana for approval of said employment and of the fees herein designated, and the Director of Finance is hereby empowered and directed to provide for payment of the work herein specified upon completion thereof and under the conditions herein enumerated without further approval of this City Council.

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ENGAGEMENT LETTER

December 9, 2025

Hon. Randy Fandal, Mayor 2055 Second Street Slidell, Louisiana 70458

Re: \$5,100,000 Utilities Revenue Bonds (DEQ) of the City if Slidell, State of Louisiana

Dear Mayor Fandal:

The purpose of this engagement letter is to set forth certain matters concerning the role we will serve and the legal services we will provide as bond counsel to the City if Slidell, State of Louisiana (the "City") in connection with the issuance of the captioned bonds (the "Bonds"). We understand that the Bonds will be issued for the purposes (the "Project") described in the resolution adopted by the Slidell City Council (the "City Council"), acting as the governing authority of the City, on December 9, 2025.

As bond counsel, we will prepare and submit to the City Council for adoption all of the legal proceedings required for the authorization, issuance, sale and delivery of the Bonds and provide advice of a traditional legal nature as to the issuance and sale of the Bonds. Our job is principally to render certain opinions to the City regarding (i) the validity of the Bonds under applicable Louisiana law, and (ii) other matters as may be applicable. The bond opinion will be based on facts and law existing as of its date. In rendering such opinion, we will rely upon the certified proceedings and other certifications of public officials and other persons furnished to our firm without undertaking to verify the same by independent investigation, and we will assume continuing compliance by the City with applicable laws and other resolutions relating to the Bonds. During the course of this engagement, we will rely upon the staff of the City and the members of the City Council to provide us with complete and timely information on all developments pertaining to any aspect of the Bonds.

In our engagement as bond counsel, we will:

- Confer with members of the working group, including you and other officials of the City, relating to the Project and review legal issues relating to the structure of the Bond issue;
- Prepare the Issuing Bond Ordinance and all related financing documents (collectively, the "Bond Documents");

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- Attend meetings of the City Council at which the Bond Documents are adopted;
- Prepare the application for approval of the issuance of the Bonds by the State Bond Commission and attend the State Bond Commission meeting at which such approval will be considered;
- Prepare the closing index and various closing certificates, and supervise the execution of certain closing documents by the various parties thereto;
- Prepare the Bonds and supervise their execution and authentication;
- Prepare complete transcripts of record covering the issuance of the Bonds and furnishing the transcripts to various parties in connection therewith; and
- Submit applicable post-closing reports to the State Bond Commission.

Our fee as bond counsel is based upon the terms, structure, size and schedule of the financing, the services provided, and the responsibilities assumed; however, our fee will not exceed that permitted by guidelines set forth by the Attorney General of the State of Louisiana and is subject to approval of the Attorney General. Our fee as bond counsel is a "contingent fee," meaning you are required to pay for our legal services only in the event the Bonds are actually sold and delivered. Other vendors or members of the working group may charge additional fees or costs for their services, which may not be contingent upon a successful delivery.

We will continue to serve as bond counsel until the delivery of the Bonds; however, the City and our firm each have the right to terminate this engagement at any time after providing reasonable advanced written notice, subject to the applicable rules of professional responsibility. Upon conclusion or termination of our representation of the City, papers and property furnished by the City will be returned promptly upon request.

Please note that we are not municipal advisors, and we do not render financial advice or other financial services to the City; however, in the course of providing traditional legal services, we may provide factual information to the City that is not specifically tailored to the Bonds or that does not rise to the level of a recommendation concerning a course of action. We will, however, analyze and advise the City regarding the legal ramifications of the structure, timing, terms and other provisions of the Bonds, as these functions are essential to developing a plan of finance.

Applicable ethical rules in Louisiana prohibit us from undertaking this representation if we represent another party that is directly adverse to the City or if there is a significant risk that other considerations will materially limit our representation of the City. We understand that the Bonds are to be sold to the Revolving Loan Fund (the "Fund") operated by the Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality (the "Department"). Our firm is currently engaged by the Department as its counsel in connection with loans made by the Fund; therefore, we are obligated by Louisiana Rules of Professional Conduct to consult with you and obtain your written consent and waiver of any conflict of interest to provide the requested services as bond counsel to the City.

The nature of our assignments is such that we do not believe our engagement will adversely impact any existing professional relationship with the City or the Department. Loans made by the Fund have defined terms and conditions that are either set by the Department or required by applicable federal or state law, rule or regulation. Our role as Department counsel will be limited to ensuring compliance with the Fund's programmatic requirements, and our role as bond counsel to the City, as set forth above, will be limited to ensuring the Bonds are valid and binding obligations, issued in accordance with those federal, state, and local laws, rules, and regulations applicable to the City. We believe the interests of the Department and the City are currently aligned, which minimizes the risk we will be asked to favor either party; nonetheless, to ensure we do not violate our ethical obligations, we affirm that we will not advocate on behalf of either party. Be advised that if a legal dispute arises between the City and the Department, our firm cannot and will not represent either party in any litigation. We understand you will be represented by your general counsel during this process as well.

As you are further aware, our firm represents the State of Louisiana and many other political subdivisions, including others in St. Tammany Parish. At this time, we do not believe any other current or past engagement of our firm adversely affects our ability to represent the City as provided in this letter; however, we invite you to discuss any concerns you have with us.

If this letter is acceptable to the City, please so indicate by executing below and returning a copy to us, retaining an original for your files. By signing this letter, you acknowledge that you have read and understand the foregoing, and on behalf of the City, expressly waive any conflict of interest that may exist and consent to Foley & Judell, L.L.P.'s provision of the services described herein. Your execution of this letter is a representation that such execution has been duly authorized and that this waiver is knowingly made, valid and enforceable.

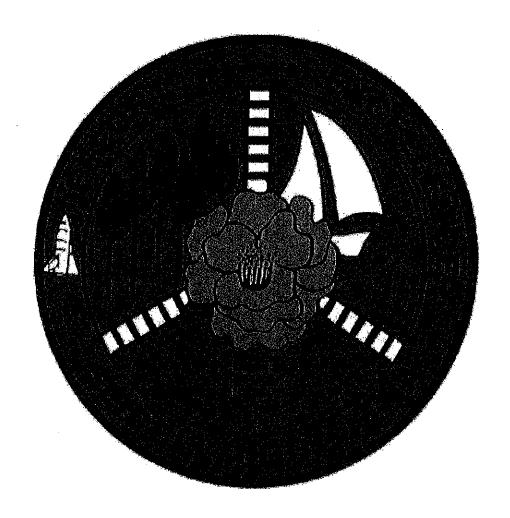

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City of Slidell Letter to User October 2025

Governmental Funds

As of October 31, 2025, the budget should be at 33.33% of its total allocation.

Revenues:

Revenues in the General Fund are trending slightly below budget at this time. This is expected, as the City does not record ad valorem tax revenues until collected, which are due December 31st, or occupational license revenues, which are due January 1st. On a positive note, interest revenues are trending higher than anticipated, with over 100% of the budget already collected in the first four months of the fiscal year.

Sales Tax Fund and Public Safety Fund are trending slightly above budget due to sales tax coming in higher than budgeted. For the first three months of the fiscal year, sales tax revenue for the Sales Tax Fund is \$7,138,988 which is up 7.88% when compared to the same time last fiscal year at \$6,617,702. The Public Safety sale tax generated \$1,557,219 in the first three months. Since the tax began on January 1, 2025, no prior-year comparison is available. It should be noted that the July breakdown between City sales tax and Police sales tax was estimated and will be updated once final allocation figures are received. Historically, sales tax revenues have consistently outperformed budget projections.

Revenues for the Slidell Business Campus are currently tracking 0.95% above budgeted levels.

The City will continuously monitor the budget in an effort to maximize revenues while also finding ways to become more efficient.

Expenditures:

The City is operating well within authorized budget parameters. As of October, expenditures across all major funds remain below the 33.33% threshold, with spending trends consistent with prior years. As of September actual expenditures as a percentage of the budget are as follows:

General Fund: 29.80% Sales Tax Fund: 29.90% Public Safety Fund: 28.27% Slidell Business Campus: 25.47%

Overall, the City's spending is well controlled and aligned with budget expectations. The City will continue to closely monitor expenditures to ensure resources are used effectively, maximizing public benefit while identifying opportunities to enhance efficiency.

ORDINANCE NO.

An ordinance amending, consolidating, and replacing portions of the Municipal Code in Chapters 2, 7, 8 and 22, and Appendices A, B, B1, and F, into the Unified Development Code per Exhibit A; and updating the official zoning map per Exhibit B.

WHEREAS, the Code of Ordinances is intended to be a living document to be updated and amended as community needs and values evolve and procedural improvements become practical; and

WHEREAS, the current provisions regulating development, construction, and zoning have resulted in an overly complicated zoning map and regulatory code, confusion for property owners and staff, less effective code administration, and have a limiting impact in achieving the City's Slidell 2040 Comprehensive Plan goals and vision; and

WHEREAS, the Unified Development Code provides a streamlined approach to land management, improves user experience, and enhances code understanding and compliance with the intention of improving the application and land development process for all by guiding residents and businesses to one place to find applicable requirements for their proposed development projects in the Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission and City Council have already completed significant progress towards the Unified Development Code by updating the sign code (adopted 1/23/24 via Ord. 4154), consolidating fees into Appendix F (adopted 1/23/24 via Ord. No. 4155), clarifying the tree and landscaping code (adopted 4/23/24 via Ord. No. 4162), updating the design guidelines for multifamily structures (adopted 5/28/24).

via Ord. No. 4175), and updating the Chapter 15 flood ordinance (adopted 1/23/24 via Ord. No. 4153), all of which are incorporated into the revised Unified Development Code organizational structure; and

WHEREAS, the general outline of this reorganization and update include: Consolidating all regulations for the Planning Commission and Board of Adjustment in existing Chapter 2 (administration) of the Code and streamline the appeals process: clarifying the Olde Towne Preservation District Commission and moving all enabling language into one Division of the UDC; addressing Building Code adoption specifics in Chapter 7; adding language clarifying the UDC's relationship to the City's Comprehensive Plan; consolidating most definitions into a single Article, except where more useful in a particular Section; consolidating all procedures into a single Article, except where more useful in a particular Section; adding language specific to nonconforming lots, uses, sites, buildings, and signs, clarifying that compliance with the Code and UDC is required when improvements or damage exceeds 45% of the structures market value; adding performance standards for lighting and glare and heat to apply to all commercial, innovation, and technology uses; removing the PUD district when development agreements were not part of the site approval, and not adding a replacement district; clarifying conditional use procedures; embedding the priority amendments undertaken prior to the UDC organization within the new UDC format; eliminating redundant or repetitive language, using consistent formatting and references, and clarifying standards where they required significant interpretation by staff: and

WHEREAS, to improve code administration, user understanding, and continue the effort to implement the Slidell 2040 Comprehensive Plan, the zoning map should address five general categories of development, including: residential neighborhoods, mixed-use corridors, commercial, innovation and technology, and, special and government-operated sites; and, including parks, conservation areas, and wildlife preserves; and

WHEREAS, the City acknowledges this amendment to the Code of Ordinances is not the final opportunity to amend existing City regulations, but represents the critical step in the ongoing process to align the Code of Ordinances with the Slidell 2040 Comprehensive Plan; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City of Slidell City Council that it hereby amends, consolidates, and replaces those portions of the City of Slidell Code of Ordinances, Chapters 2, 7, 8 and 22, and Appendices A, B, B1, and F, into the Unified Development Code as stated in the specific provisions recited per Exhibit A; and updating the official zoning map per Exhibit B.
