6 to order in the Council Chambers. A quorum was present.

22 green space for that area. The Planning Director Danny McElmurray replied that the
23 property will be used for single family residential, not a business. As there was no further

it be substituted with the corrected page.


15 Mayor Fandal mentioned that the recent Mayor's Community Prayer Breakfast

21 Towne and Sunday the Krewe of Dionysus will roll.


22 **POLICE CHIEF COMMENTS AND REPORTS**

An ordinance making an honorary designation of Carey Street, between Front Street and Pontchartrain Drive, in Slidell, LA as Dr. Gerry Hinton Memorial Road.

WHEREAS, Dr. Gerry Hinton, a beloved husband, father, and chiropractor, was a distinguished member of the Slidell community; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Hinton was also a dedicated public servant, having served for 16 years as a Slidell city councilman and, later, as a three-term Louisiana state senator; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Hinton was a major proponent for, and instrumental in, the adoption of a chiropractic licensing act in Louisiana, and he sat for 9 years on the Louisiana Board of Chiropractic Examiners; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Hinton was also a veteran of the U.S. Army, having served in the Korean War; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Hinton passed away on July 2, 2000, after a battle with lung cancer; and

WHEREAS, it is fitting to honor the memory and legacy of Dr. Hinton by making an honorary designation of a portion of Carey Street in Slidell, LA—a street on which Dr. Hinton maintained an office—as Dr. Gerry Hinton Memorial Road.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Slidell City Council, in legal session convened, that Carey Street, between Front Street and Pontchartrain Drive, in Slidell, LA is hereby further designated as Dr. Gerry Hinton Memorial Road, and such honorary designation shall be evidenced by appropriate street signage provided by the City.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that this honorary designation shall not alter the official mailing address of parcels on Carey Street with respect to the records of any public body or agency, including the St. Tammany Parish Registrar of Voters, the St. Tammany Parish Assessor, and the United States Postal Service, the Carey Street name to survive.

RESOLUTION R26-07

A RESOLUTION ORDERING AND CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF SLIDELL, STATE OF LOUISIANA, TO AUTHORIZE THE CONTINUATION, LEVY AND COLLECTION OF SPECIAL TAXES THEREIN; MAKING APPLICATION TO THE LOUISIANA STATE BOND COMMISSION AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

WHEREAS, the City Council, acting as the governing authority (the "Governing Authority"), of the City of Slidell, State of Louisiana (the "City"), previously submitted to the qualified voters of the City certain ad valorem tax propositions (the "Taxes"); and

WHEREAS, this Governing Authority desires to call an election on June 27, 2026 (the "Election") to authorize the continuation of the Taxes and to take all necessary actions ancillary thereto; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by this Governing Authority, that:

SECTION 1. Election Call. Subject to the approval of the Louisiana State Bond Commission (the "State Bond Commission"), and under the authority conferred by Article VI, Section 32 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana of 1974, the applicable provisions of Chapter 5, Chapter 6-A and Chapter 6-B of Title 18 of the Louisiana Election Code, and other constitutional and statutory authority, a special election is hereby called and ordered to be held in the City on Saturday, **June 27, 2026**, between the hours of seven o'clock (7:00) a.m., and eight o'clock (8:00) p.m., in accordance with the provisions of La. R.S. 18:541, and at the Election there shall be submitted to all registered voters qualified and entitled to vote at the election under the Constitution and laws of this State and the Constitution of the United States, the following propositions, to-wit:

21 "Tax"), for a period of ten (10) years, beginning with the year 2026 and
22 ending with the year 2055, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining
23 garbage disposal works and refuse and garbage collection and disposal
24 systems within and for the City?

26 **SECTION 2. Publication of Notice of Election.** A Notice of Special Election shall
27 be published in the *St. Tammany Farmer*, a newspaper of general circulation and being
28 the official journal of the City, once a week for four (4) consecutive weeks, with the first
29 publication to be made not less than forty-five (45) days nor more than ninety (90) days
30 prior to the date fixed for the Election, which Notice shall be substantially in the form
31 attached hereto as **Exhibit "A"** and incorporated herein by reference the same as if it
32 were set forth herein in full with such changes as may be necessary to be made at the
33 discretion of the Mayor, Council Administrator or such other representative of the City as
34 shall have the apparent authority to make said changes (collectively or individually, the
35 **"Authorized Representative"**).

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6 **SECTION 3. Canvass.** This Governing Authority shall meet at its regular meeting
7 place, Council Chambers, 2045 Second Street, 3rd Floor, Slidell, Louisiana, on **July 28,**
8 **2026, at Six-Thirty O'clock (6:30) p.m.**, and shall then and there in open and public
9 session proceed to examine and canvass the returns and declare the results of the
10 Election. This Governing Authority reserves the right to postpone the date and time set
11 forth above for the canvass of the returns (without any further publication of notice of the
12 change in the date, time and/or location).
13

14 **SECTION 4. Polling Places.** The polling places set forth in the aforesaid Notice of
15 Special Election are hereby designated as the polling places at which to hold the Election,
16 and the Commissioners-in-Charge and Commissioners, respectively, will be the same
17 persons as those designated in accordance with law.
18

19 **SECTION 5. Election Commissioners; Voting Machines.** The officers
20 designated to serve as Commissioners-in-Charge and Commissioners pursuant to Section
21 4 hereof, or such substitutes therefor as may be selected and designated in accordance
22 with La. R.S. 18:1287, shall hold the Election as herein provided, and shall make due
23 returns of the Election for the meeting of the Governing Authority to be held on **July 28,**
24 **2026**, as provided in Section 3 hereof. All registered voters in the City are entitled to vote
25 at Election and voting machines shall be used.
26

27 **SECTION 6. Authorization of Authorized Representatives.** The Authorized
28 Representative (either of them acting alone) of this Governing Authority is hereby
29 empowered, authorized and directed to arrange for and to furnish to the Election officers in
30 ample time for the holding of the Election, the necessary equipment, forms and other
31 paraphernalia essential to the proper holding of the Election and the Authorized
32 Representative (either of them acting alone) of this Governing Authority are further
33 authorized, empowered and directed to take any and all further action required by State
34 and/or Federal law to arrange for the Election and, if applicable, appropriate submission to

4 the Federal Department of Justice under Section 5 of the Federal Voting Rights Act of
5 1965, as amended.

7 **SECTION 7. Furnishing Election Call to Election Officials.** Certified copies of
8 this Resolution shall be forwarded to the Secretary of State, the Clerk of Court and *Ex-*
9 *Officio* Parish Custodian of Voting Machines in and for the Parish of St. Tammany, State of
10 Louisiana (the "Parish"), and the Registrar of Voters in and for said Parish, as notification
11 of the Election herein called in order that each may prepare for the Election and perform
12 their respective functions as required by law.
13

14 **SECTION 8. Employment of Counsel.** It is recognized, found, and determined
15 that a real necessity exists for the employment of special legal counsel in connection with
16 the Election and accordingly, Boles Shafto, LLC, Monroe, Louisiana ("Special Counsel"),
17 is hereby employed and requested to do and perform comprehensive legal and coordinate
18 professional work with respect to the Election. Said Special Counsel shall prepare and
19 submit to this Governing Authority for adoption all the proceedings incidental to the
20 authorization of the Election. The fee of Special Counsel in connection with the Election is
21 hereby fixed at a sum not to exceed the maximum hourly fee allowed by the Attorney
22 General's fee guidelines for comprehensive legal and coordinate professional services in
23 an amount not to exceed \$5,000, plus "out-of-pocket" expenses. The term of this
24 engagement shall have an effective date beginning on January 13, 2026 and extending no
25 later than January 12, 2027. The scope of this legal representation does not involve
26 federal claims. An Authorized Representative of the City is authorized and directed to enter
27 into a legal services agreement ("LSA") with Special Counsel embodying the terms of this
28 engagement in accordance with Attorney General requirements and guidelines, and a
29 copy of such LSA, along with a certified copy of this resolution shall be forwarded to
30 Attorney General for their approval.

32 **SECTION 9. Application to State Bond Commission.** Application is made to the
33 State Bond Commission for consent and authority to hold the Election as herein provided,
34 and in the event that Election carries for further consent and authority to dedicate the



Governmental Funds

As of December 31, 2025, the budget should be at 50.00% of its total allocation.

Revenues:

Revenues in the General Fund are trending slightly below budget at this time. This is expected, as the City does not record ad valorem tax revenues until collected, which are due December 31st, or occupational license revenues, which are due January 1st. On a positive note, interest revenues are trending higher than anticipated, with over 100% of the budget already collected in the six five months of the fiscal year.

Sales Tax Fund and Public Safety Fund are trending slightly above budget due to sales tax coming in higher than budgeted. For the first five months of the fiscal year, sales tax revenue for the Sales Tax Fund is \$11,727,238 which is up 5.89% when compared to the same time last fiscal year at \$11,074,560. The Public Safety sale tax generated \$2,588,769 in the first five months. Since the tax began on January 1, 2025, no prior-year comparison is available. It should be noted that the July breakdown between City sales tax and Police sales tax was estimated and will be updated once final allocation figures are received. Historically, sales tax revenues have consistently outperformed budget projections.

Revenues for the Slidell Business Campus are currently tracking 0.72% above budgeted levels.

The City will continuously monitor the budget in an effort to maximize revenues while also finding ways to become more efficient.

Expenditures:

The City is operating well within authorized budget parameters. As of December, expenditures across all major funds remain below the 50.00% threshold, with spending trends consistent with prior years. As of December actual expenditures as a percentage of the budget are as follows:

General Fund: 45.14%

Sales Tax Fund: 44.32%

Public Safety Fund: 46.11%

Slidell Business Campus: 35.66%

Overall, the City's spending is well controlled and aligned with budget expectations. The City will continue to closely monitor expenditures to ensure resources are used effectively, maximizing public benefit while identifying opportunities to enhance efficiency.

ORDINANCE NO.

An ordinance amending the Code of Ordinances of the City of Slidell, Chapter 21 (Personnel), Article IV (Employee Retirement Systems), Section 21-81 (Municipal employees' retirement system) to provide for the limited City coverage of three (3%) percent of employee retirement contributions for those unelected City municipal employees participating in the Municipal Employees' Retirement System.

WHEREAS, in an effort to remain competitive in the recruitment and retention of outstanding City employees, the City of Slidell wishes to provide for a limited payment share of the required employee contribution into the Municipal Employees' Retirement System for each unelected City municipal employee, which payment share is in addition to the separate employer contribution required of public employers by law, all subject to Council appropriation.

WHEREAS, a similar retirement contribution payment share has already been provided for non-elected employees on the Slidell Police Department side of the house.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Slidell City Council that it does hereby amend Chapter 21 (Personnel), Article IV (Employee Retirement Systems), Section 21-81 (Municipal employees' retirement system) of the City's Code of Ordinances as follows:

Subsection (f) is deleted in its entirety and subsection (e) is amended and restated to state as follows:

Sec. 21-81. - Municipal employees' retirement system.

(e) The City shall pay three (3%) percent of the required employee contribution of unelected, municipal employees (i.e. City employees not in Slidell Police Department) into

the Municipal Employees' Retirement System, subject to appropriation by the Council adequate to cover such costs. When so appropriated, such payment shall be made by direct payment from the City to the respective retirement system. The employee shall otherwise be responsible for the balance of the required employee contribution.

city attorney with the approval of the mayor shall secure special counsel to represent the official, officer or employee at city expense.

(d) *Decision not to defend by city attorney.* In any case where the city attorney does not undertake the representation of the official, officer or employee, the city attorney may take such action as he deems necessary including enrolling as co-counsel, to protect the interests of the city. The decision of the city attorney not to defend an official, officer or employee and any and all information obtained by him as a result of the investigations conducted pursuant to subsection (c)(3) or (c)(4) shall be considered confidential and shall not be admissible as evidence in any legal proceeding and no reference thereto shall be made in any trial or hearing.

(e) *Liability for monetary damages.* If an official, officer or employee of the city is held liable for monetary damages for actions arising under the circumstances provided by this section, the city shall appropriate a sum sufficient to reimburse the official, officer or employee. The court, upon request of any party, shall give written findings of fact as to whether the official, officer or employee was acting in the discharge of his duties and within the scope of his employment, and whether the damages were the result of the intentional wrongful act or gross negligence of the official, officer or employee. An out-of-court settlement shall have the effect of a judgment of a court of competent jurisdiction for purposes of this section, but the settlement shall be approved by the city attorney.

(f) *Private counsel.* Nothing in this section shall in any way impair, limit or modify the rights and obligations of any insurer under any policy of insurance or impair the right of the individual to obtain private counsel in his own behalf. However, the city shall not be obligated to indemnify the individual for the attorney fees so incurred, except as provided in subsection (c)(3) of this section.

(g) *Compromise settlement.* Nothing in this section shall prohibit the city from entering into a compromise settlement or agreement with the claimant prior to any judgment.

(h) *Death.* In the event of the death of officials, officers and employees of the city, the benefits of this section shall inure to their heirs, legatees, successors or assigns.

Nothing in this article shall be construed to have any effect or impact on, or derogate from any other power given elsewhere in the Charter or this code to other departments or entities of the city with respect to any health, disability, life or unemployment insurance or coverage. Nothing in this article shall be deemed to have any effect upon any bonds provided in connection with a public works contract; any fidelity bonding contracts, provisions or requirements; or any performance or delivery agreements which include performance or delivery bond or insurance provisions. ARTICLE IV. EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT SYSTEMS*

Sec. 21-81. Municipal employees' retirement system.

(a) The provisions of R.S. 11:1731—11:1868, and any amendments thereto, establishing the Municipal Employees Retirement System of Louisiana (MERS) shall be applicable to eligible employees of the city.

(b) Eligible employees of the city may take such actions as may be required by applicable laws and regulations in order to receive MERS benefits under applicable law.

(c) Withholdings from salaries or wages of employees for the purpose of this section are authorized to be made in the amount and at such times as may be required by the MERS Board of Trustees in accordance with R.S. 11:1731 et seq., and shall be paid over to the board in such amounts and at such times as are designated by state law and MERS regulations.

(d) Employer contributions and assessments for administrative expenses shall be paid from amounts appropriated for such purposes to the MERS Board of Trustees in accordance with applicable state law and MERS regulations. The term "employer" shall be defined as the city.

(e) For employees hired prior to April 26, 2011, and in accordance with the authority granted under the provisions of R.S. 11:1168, the city shall pay to MERS, from its own funds, 100 percent of the employee contributions referenced R.S. 11:1786, 11:1806 and 11:1864.

Notwithstanding any provision to the contrary, any person subject to this subsection shall pay 50 percent of the contributions referenced herein from their own funds beginning July 1, 2013, and shall pay 100 percent of such contributions from their own funds beginning July 1, 2014.

(f) Employees hired subsequent to April 26, 2011, shall pay to MERS, from their own funds, 100 percent of the employee contributions referenced in R.S. 11:1786, 11:1806 and 11:1864. (Ord. No. 3606, § 3, 4-26-2011; Ord. No. 3671, 1-22-2013)

Sec. 21-82. Municipal police employees' retirement system.

(a) The provisions of R.S. 11:2211—11:2234 and any amendments thereto, establishing the Municipal Police Employees' Retirement System (MPERS), shall be applicable to eligible employees and chief of police of the Slidell Police Department.

(b) Eligible Slidell Police Department employees and the chief of police may take such actions as may be required by applicable laws and regulations in order to receive MPERS benefits under applicable law.

(c) Withholdings from salaries or wages of employees for the purpose of this section are authorized to be made in the amount and at such times as may be required by the MPERS Board of Trustees in accordance with R.S. 11:2211 et seq., and shall be paid over to the board in such amounts and at such times as are designated by state law and MPERS regulations.

(d) Employer contributions and assessments for administrative expenses shall be paid from amounts appropriated for such purposes to the MPERS Board of Trustees in accordance with applicable state law and MPERS regulations. The term "employer" shall be defined as the city.

(e) The city shall pay three percent of the required employee contribution of unelected Slidell Police Department employees into the municipal police employees' retirement system or the municipal employees retirement system, respectively, depending on which system the employee is a part of, subject to annual appropriation by the council adequate to cover such costs. When so appropriated, such payment shall be made by direct payment from the city to the respective retirement system. In no event shall the city pay this contribution share amount into more than one state retirement system per Slidell Police Department employee. The employee shall otherwise be responsible for the balance of the required employee contribution.

Sec. 21-83. Full-time elected officials.

(a) For any full-time elected official elected prior to April 26, 2011, who is not eligible for membership in either MERS or MPERS, the city shall pay into a deferred compensation plan an amount equal to the employer's and employee's portion of contributions that otherwise would have been paid to MERS or MPERS had the full-time elected official been eligible to participate

ORDINANCE NO.

An ordinance amending the Code of Ordinances of the City of Slidell, Chapter 14, Section 14-21 to require restricted access communities to install a siren operated sensor in connection with obtaining a building permit.

WHEREAS, the City of Slidell is charged with helping to protect the health, safety, and welfare of its citizens; and,

WHEREAS, residential communities with restricted gate access create a unique challenge for emergency responders which could affect the health and safety of the residents of those communities; and,

WHEREAS, rather than provide access codes or physical keys which change frequently, new technology exists to allow emergency responders to gain immediate access to gated communities using siren operated sensors; and,

WHEREAS, siren operated sensors are a convenient and low-cost solution compatible with all access gates, which work by detecting a specific sound pattern, such as a "Yelp" siren, and triggering access; and,

WHEREAS, in order to ensure expedient access by emergency responders, all new subdivisions, apartment complexes, and other residential communities with restricted gate access applying for building permits on or after March 1, 2026, or existing private subdivisions, apartment complexes, and other residential communities applying for a building permit affecting their gate access on or after March 1, 2026, shall be required to install and maintain a siren operated sensor as part of any such permit issued; and,

WHEREAS, additionally, any existing private subdivision, apartment complex, and other residential community with restricted gate access is strongly encouraged to install a siren operated sensor to ensure the timely response by first responders to the residents thereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Slidell City Council, in legal session convened, that the City of Slidell Code of Ordinances, Chapter 14 – FIRE PREVENTION AND PROTECTION, ARTICLE II – FIRE PREVENTION, Section 14-21. – Code adopted., is amended to provide as hereby follows:

Sec. 14-21. – Code adopted.

(c) *Supplemental requirement.* Any subdivision, apartment complex, or other residential community shall, in connection with an application for, and issuance of, a building permit authorizing the installation of restricted gate access to same, or in connection with an application for, and issuance of, a building permit affecting any pre-existing restricted gate access to same, be required to install and maintain the functionality of a siren operated sensor to ensure immediate access by emergency responders, including fire, law enforcement, and emergency medical services.

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Secs. 14-1—14-20. Reserved.

ARTICLE II. FIRE PREVENTION

Sec. 14-21. Code adopted.

(a) There is hereby adopted a fire code for the city to provide the city with rules and regulations to improve the public safety by promoting the control of fire hazards; regulating the installation, use and maintenance of equipment; regulating the use of structures, premises and open areas; providing for the abatement of fire hazards; establishing the responsibilities and the procedures for code enforcement; and setting forth the standards for compliance and achievement of these objectives.

(b) This city adopts as its fire code the most current editions of the National Fire Protection Association Life Safety Code (NFPA 101) and the National Fire Protection Association Fire Code (NFPA 1) as are in effect from time to time. The bureau of fire prevention shall maintain a current edition of the city's fire code.

Sec. 14-22. Scope of code.

The requirements of the city fire code shall apply equally to both public and private property, and it shall apply to all structures and their occupants, except as otherwise specified.

Sec. 14-23. Construction of article.

This article shall be deemed an exercise of the police powers of the city for the preservation and protection of the public health, peace, safety and welfare, and all the requirements of the city fire code shall be liberally construed for that purpose. (Code 1966, § 10-15)

Sec. 14-24. Enforcement officers.

(a) The fire chief of the St. Tammany Parish Fire Protection District No. 1 shall be responsible for the enforcement of the city fire code. He shall detail such members of the fire department as inspectors as shall from time to time be necessary. To assist in the performance of the responsibilities and duties placed upon the fire chief of St. Tammany Parish Fire Protection District No. 1, a bureau of fire prevention in the fire department shall be created.

(b) This bureau shall operate under the provisions of the fire chief of St. Tammany Parish Fire Protection District No. 1. The Fire Protection District No. 1 may designate a fire official of St. Tammany Parish Fire Protection District No. 1 as fire marshal. The fire marshal shall be the administrator of the bureau of fire prevention. The fire marshal shall be responsible for the direct administration and enforcement of the city fire code as may be set forth by the St. Tammany Parish Fire Protection District No. 1. The fire marshal shall be appointed on the basis of examinations or other method for determining his qualifications. The fire chief of St. Tammany Parish Fire Protection District No. 1 may also designate such number of technical inspectors as shall from time to time be authorized by the board of commissioners of the St. Tammany Parish Fire Protection District No. 1. Such technical inspectors shall be selected through an examination to determine their fitness for the position.

(c) It shall be the duty of the officers of the bureau of fire prevention to enforce all laws and ordinances of the city covering the following:

- (1) The prevention of fires;
- (2) The storage and use of explosives and flammables;
- (3) The installation and maintenance of automatic and other fire alarm systems, and fire extinguishing equipment;
- (4) The maintenance and regulation of fire escapes;
- (5) The means and adequacy of exit in case of fire, from factories, schools, hotels,
