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

Shall the City of Slidell, State of Louisiana (the "City"), under the provisions of Article VI, Section 29, of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana of 1974, Sub-Part

D, Part I, Chapter 6, Title 33 of Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950, as amended, and other constitutional and statutory authority supplemental thereto, be authorized to levy and collect, and adopt an ordinance providing for such levy and collection, an additional tax of one per cent (1%) (the "Tax") upon the sale at retail, the use, the lease or rental, the consumption and storage for use or consumption, of tangible personal property and on sales of services in the City, all as defined in La. R.S. 47:301 through La. R.S. 47:317, with the proceeds of the Tax (after paying the reasonable and necessary expenses of collecting and administering the Tax) to be dedicated and used for purchasing, constructing, acquiring, extending, improving, maintaining and/or operating public facilities, public works or capital improvements and paying the capital costs of police protection and public safety for said City or any sites, equipment and furnishings therefor, as established and set forth in the City's then current budget adopted after public hearings held in the manner contemplated by the Home Rule Charter of said City, and further shall the City be further authorized to fund the proceeds of the Tax into bonds for the capital purposes set forth above, for providing a reserve for said bonds and for paying the costs of issuance therefor, said bonds to mature over a term not exceeding twenty-five (25) years from date thereof, to bear interest at a rate or rates of interest not exceeding twelve per centum (12%) per annum and to be issued in accordance with the provisions of and subject to the limitations of Sub-Part F, Part III, Chapter 4, Title 39 of the Louisiana Revised Statutes of 1950 and other constitutional and statutory authority supplemental thereto, as the same now exist or may hereafter be amended?
