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20 WHEREAS, the Cable Communications Act of 1984
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22 restricted states' and local governments' abilities to regulate
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24 the cable television industry directly; and
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26 WHEREAS, since the passage of the Cable Communications
27
28 Act of 1984, concentrations of ownership amounting to monopolies
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30 have increased among cable operators, even though that Act was
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32 intended to "promote competition in cable communications and
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34 minimize unnecessary regulations that impose undue economic
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36 burden on cable systems"; and
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38 WHEREAS, municipalities throughout the nation,
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40 including this one, have been subjected to substantial rate
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42 increases; and
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44 WHEREAS, more than half of the nation's households,
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46 and more than 15,000 of the residents of this City subscribe to
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48 cable, and cable television is increasingly becoming the main
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50 means of access to information and entertainment; and
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52 WHEREAS, cable subscribers in this City have been
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54 subjected to substantial rate increases over the past several
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56 years; and
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58 WHEREAS, cable television is rapidly being priced
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60 beyond the reach of lower income people, including families with
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62 children and the elderly, who are particularly in need of
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64 information and other services that are available solely through
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66 cable television; and
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68 WHEREAS, the diversity of information services
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70 promised by the 1984 Cable Communications Act has failed to
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72 materialize; and
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
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12 WHEREAS, the promise of universal service, similarly,
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14 has not been fulfilled; and

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16 WHEREAS, existing law provides this City and other
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18 franchising authorities no authority to control or question the
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20 imposition by cable franchises of exorbitant rates upon citizens
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22 whose rights-of-way have been placed at the companies' disposal
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24 by virtue of the grant of franchises.

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26 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that

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28 1. The Slidell City Council declares its support for the
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30 restoration of local regulatory authority over cable
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32 television systems.
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34 2. The Congress of the United States should rewrite the
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36 Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984, with particular
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38 focus on re-regulation of subscriber rates, allowance of
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40 telephone company provision of cable service under
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42 circumstances that respect local government authority,
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44 system ownership transfers, the impact of vertical
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46 integration in the cable industry, and other aspects of
47
48 the Act that directly impact local regulation and
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50 consumers.
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52 3. The Slidell City Council urges Congressional action for
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54 appropriate federal legislation to restore local
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56 authority over cable systems, to eliminate the barriers
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58 to competition, and to rectify other aspects of the 1984
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60 Act that work to disfavor cable consumers.
