## **RESOLUTION NO. R02-37**

A resolution of the Slidell City Council, St. Tammany Parish, State of Louisiana, requesting the United States Congress to reconsider the deregulation of the Cable TV industry.

WHEREAS, in 1998, the United States Congress deregulated the Cable TV industry with the hopes of promoting competition and lower consumer prices; and

WHEREAS, most communities in our country have non-exclusive Cable
TV franchises, but only one Cable TV provider; and

WHEREAS, the Cable TV industry still has a monopoly or oligopoly in its service area, regardless of the deregulation intent of Congress; and

WHEREAS, the City of Slidell, Louisiana, has seen Cable TV rates continue to climb at a rate far exceeding the Consumer Price Index; and

WHEREAS, the City of Slidell is facing a 7.2% rate increase in its expanded service for the coming year (\$43.80 rate), and has had cumulative rate increases of 48% since 1998 (\$29.67 rate) and 82% since 1996 (\$24.06 rate); and

WHEREAS, as a result of deregulation our City has no control whatsoever over the Cable TV provider, nor does our State or Nation; and

WHEREAS, the City of Slidell feels deregulation of the Cable industry has been unsuccessful and some regulatory authority should be given to the State or Local Political Subdivisions.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Slidell City Council, St. Tammany Parish, State of Louisiana, that it does hereby ask the United States Congress through its Louisiana Congressional delegation to once again consider regulatory controls over the Cable TV industry and to permit political subdivisions of the United States in the form of State or local governments to have some input into the regulation of Cable TV rates on a State or local level.
